Nabeela's Eichler-made Treats

Baking can be a meditative process, and doing it in your own Eichler kitchen sparks a special kind of joy. But I was surprised last year when I stumbled across Nabeela Aijiz and her business Nabeela's Bakery on Instagram, and realized she was running it from her Eichler on Fairhill. Then I saw she was baking key lime pies (my absolute favorite) using limes from her backyard. One bite, and I've been hooked. I sat down with Nabeela to find out what it's like to make scrumptious pastries and breads for the people of San Jose.

How long have you been in the neighborhood?

Almost 2 years and 2 months.

Why did you decide to live in an Eichler?

I only wanted an Eichler house. I wanted to study architecture, but due to a series of unfortunate incidents, I ended up as an engineer. When we first started our house search, I said, "No cookie cutter houses. I need to find an architecturally beautiful house. We have to find an Eichler."


Was a good kitchen a priority in your home search?

I wanted a kitchen that was really functional because I cook and bake a lot. When we were house hunting, I did try to find a really good kitchen, but knew I could work anywhere. I lived in a tiny apartment when I started my business and I still made the kitchen work. If you have the will, you'll find the way.

How did you become a baker?

I've always been into food. I would read about cookies and cakes that we didn't have in India where I grew up. When I moved to the US, I said, "I can bake these things now."

I realized I wanted to move into the food industry because engineering was fun and I'm good at it, but it wasn't where my passion is. I started an internship at Urban Farm Collective in Sunnyvale, got my foot into the food

industry, and slowly went from job to job. Then I realized it made more sense to have my own business. I've been in the industry for almost 8 years now.

To get a license for a home kitchen, you have to jump through so many hoops. I spent a lot of money and time getting licensed. Then I started advertising on my apartment complex's social hub. Neighbors were curious because they had seen my cakes at potlucks and started buying.

My business thrived during the pandemic because people didn't want to go out to bakeries. I delivered door to door, and it became successful.

When I moved to the neighborhood, I had to re-grow my customer base, so I started advertising on NextDoor. I still have a few customers from my old

neighborhood, though, and I have quite a few neighbors who buy

What is your favorite thing to bake?

Sourdough bread. It requires a lot of technical skill. I like anything that uses all my technical skills in baking.

What are your culinary inspirations?

The California cuisine has inspired me. Living in the Bay Area, where we have farmers markets, is amazing. I'll go to the farmers market and be like "Oh, there's rhubarb! I should make a rhubarb cake." Also, since I come from India, I try to combine my Indian heritage with what we have here. I'll do a chaat, an Indian street food, but Americanized, with local ingredients such as asparagus.

What is your current home project or one you're looking forward to starting?

We're doing our front yard and back yard landscaping right now. Hopefully after that we will extend our solar, as part of a roof over the outdoor kitchen. So in the future, we'll have enough battery power to be off the grid for a while.

Fairglen Flashback!

Did you know we used to host a big art festival each year?

The Fairglen Art Festival started as one woman's art show and became a draw for artists and crafts-makers around the Bay Area. In 1962, Maggie Caploe of Fairgrove Court set up an exhibit of her crafts inside her Eichler and then invited her neighbors over for a look. Soon, fellow neighbors joined Maggie in displaying their art. The Fairglen Art Festival was born.

The festival was most active in the 1970s and 80s, petering out in the 90s. Not to brag, but it was likely the largest public event to ever take place in an Eichler neighborhood.


Although we no longer run the art festival, the FAF spirit is alive and well, evidenced by neighborhood artists who are still holding Open Studios where they showcase and sell their artwork. This May, Jonathan and Joella Kermit of 1622 Andalusia and Susan Butler-Graham of 1671 Fairwood hosted Open Studios where they showcased their art. All three artists participated in the original festival, as well.

The Kermits have lived in their Eichler for 44 years, describing it as their "first and only house." Jonathan creates sculptures out of metal and found materials or "urban flotsam," while Joella creates botanical prints using a technique known as eco-dyeing.
